In the name of God amen I Samuel Coborn of the Township of Shrewsbury in the County of Monmouth and
Eastern Division of the Province of New Jersey being to my Richard and wife his Body Sick and Perfect mind
And my very thanks be unto God for the same Do make Ordain Constitute and appoint this my Last Will and
Testament in manner following first and principally I give my soul to God that gave it and my Body to
the Earth to be therein decently buried According to the Desire of my Executors
I Give my said and Bequeath unto my Loving wife Jane Coborn the Plantation that I bought of Misses Longstreet
and Richard Chamberlin during her Natural Life Excepting one half of the meadow that lies on the North side of
Squam River and likewise Excepting two thirds of the meadow that lies on the South side of the said Squam River
that belongs to the said Plantation

Also I Give and Bequeath unto my Loving Wife Jane Coborn one Negro Woman named Rachel one bed and
bedding Two Cows Six Sheep and the Choice of my Horses to Dispose of as she may think proper in view of her Wills
I Give and Bequeath unto my Eldest Son Samuel Coborn the sum of Ten pounds Proclamation Money to be
Paid to him by my Son Abraham Coborn Within Three ~~months~~ years after my Decease

I Give and Bequeath unto my Son Abraham Coborn all my Land and Moveable Estate both Real and Personal
Excepting that Part that I have already Given to my Wife Jane Coborn and the Plantation that I have
Given to my wife during her Natural Life After her Decease I Give and Bequeath it to my Son
Abraham Coborn and also all the Remainder Part of my Land and Moveable Estate both Real and
Personal I Give and Bequeath the same unto my Son Abraham Coborn to him and Heirs

That Ever
I Give and Bequeath unto my Daughter Mercy Jossue the sum of Thirty pounds New York Currency
to be Paid by my Son Abraham Coborn within three years after my Decease

I Give and Bequeath unto my Daughter Catharine Green the sum of Fifty pounds New York Currency
to be Paid by my Son Abraham Coborn within six years after my Decease

I Give and Bequeath unto my Daughter Hannah Coborn the sum of Fifty pounds New York Currency
to be Paid when she arriveth to the age of Eighteen years the said Money to be Paid by my Son Abraham Coborn

To be paid by my son Abraham Osborn within six years after my decease
I give and bequeath unto my daughter Hannah Osborn the sum of fifty pounds new York Currency
to be paid when she arriveth to the age of Eighteen years the said Money to be paid by my son Abraham Osborn
Also I do hereby Order my son Abraham Osborn to pay all my just debts and funeral Charges
I therefore constitute make and Ordain my Loving Wife Jane Osborn Executrix and my son
Abraham Osborn Executor In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal
