#1600. John Osborn's Estate

Know all men by these presents that we Edward Osborn, Abraham Powell, & James Osborn, of the County of Champaign and state of Ohio, are held and firmly bound unto the State of Ohio, in the sum of Sixteen hundred dollars. for the payment of which we bind ourselves, our heirs, executors, and administrators jointly and severally firmly by these presents. Witness our hands and seals this 18th day of May 1847. The condition of the above obligation is such that whereas by the Court of Common Pleas of said County, the above named Edward Osborn has this day been appointed administrator of the personal estate of John Osborn, deceased, Now therefore, if the said Edward Osborn shall make and return unto said court, on oath, within three months a true inventory of all the moneys, goods, chattels, rights and credits of the said deceased, which have or shall come to his possession or knowledge, —

And also, administer according to Law all the moneys, goods, chattels, rights and credits of said deceased, and the proceeds of all his real estate that may be sold for the payment of his debts, which shall at any time come to the possession of said administrator or to the possession of any other person for him, And also pay any balance render upon oath, a true account of his administration, within eighteen months, and at any other times when required by the Court, or by the Law

And also, pay any balance remaining in his hands upon the settlement of his accounts, to such persons as the court or the Law shall direct, and deliver the Letters of administration unto Court, in case any will of the deceased shall be hereafter duly proved and allowed. Then the above obligation to be void, otherwise to remain in force.
