and did see John Lukens the testator sign and seal
and did hear him pronounce and declare the same
to be his last will and testament ~~and at the time~~
thereof he was of sound disposing mind memory and
understanding to the best of their knowledge & belief
and that they signed their names as witnesses to
the same in the presence of the testator and at his
request. — Be it remembered that on the 18th day
of September Anno Domini 1813 the foregoing will of
John Lukens deceased was proved in due form of
law, and letters Testamentary were granted to his
three sons David, George, and Joel Executors in the
testament named they having been first duly affi-
med well and truly to execute the same and to
render an account according to law. Given under

Jane Osborne
Be it remembered that I Jane Osborne of the town-
ship of Whitpain in the county of Montgomery and
State of Pennsylvania widow being advanced in years
but of sound and disposing mind, do make the
following disposition of my worldly estate, to wit. I give
unto my brother Evan two bonds against him
one of fifteen pounds the other of thirty, with all the
Interest that may be unpaid thereon, in case he shall
survive me it is my will said bonds shall be in favour
of his Children equally. I give unto my bro-
ther Robert the sum of forty pounds as soon as of his
death to his Children equally. I give unto my

Nephew John Hallman the sum of forty pounds, I give unto the children of Evan as follows, unto John the sum of twenty pounds, unto Margaret I give my best case of drawers, Oval Table two brass Kettles and two large table cloths, to Susanna my maple case of drawers tea table and tea Kettle, and to Rachel an upper and lower feather bed bedstead curtains and all the bedding, I give unto David the cow he had of me and the sum of twenty pounds, I give unto Joseph and Evan the sum of twenty pounds each, if Evan shall die under age his legacie to go to John David and Joseph equally. I give unto Sarah Thomas the sum of ten pounds Stern - I give unto Job Thomas the sum of forty pounds to be paid him when he arrives at twenty one years, but if he dies under age his legacie shall vest in Samuel Thomas. I give unto Samuel Thomas the sum of one hundred pounds and do appoint him Executor of this my will. - I give all the residue of my Estate whatsoever unto my three nieces, Margaret, Susanna, and Rachel Thomas, to be equally divided between them. Lastly - I do revoke all will or wills by me heretofore made ratifying this only for my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the third day of May one thousand eight hundred and three

Whereas I Jane Osborne of Whitpain township widow have duly made and published my last will & testament in writing bearing date the 3^d day of May 1803 wherein I have bequeathed the sum of forty pounds unto my nephew John Hallman who is since deceased Now I do by this writing (which I do declare to be a codicil to the said will and testament) order and direct that the sum of five pounds be paid unto each of the children of the said John Hallman as they respectively arrive at the age of twenty

521 one year the males, and the females at the age of
eighteen years, and I do also hereby declare that my
said will in writing within written and this Codicil
which I will shall be annexed to and taken as part
thereof do contain my last will and testament. In wit-
ness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal
the fifth day of May one thousand eight hundred and
ten. NB if any or either of the said Children of the
said John Hallman should die under the age above
specified in such case, I will that such accounts shall
shall be equally divided amongst the surviving brothers

Be it remembered that I Jacob Corber Senior of Hatfield Township in the county of Montgomery and State of Pennsylvania Yeoman being considerably advanced in years of age but in a good state of health and of a sound and disposing mind & memory blessed be God for the same. Taking into consideration the uncertainty of this Transitory life do this fifth day of February in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and twelve, make order and establish this to be my last will and testament in manner following

First I order and direct all my Just debts and funeral expences to be paid by my hereinafter named executor

Item - I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Catharine my best bested bedding and furniture there unto belonging, with all the household goods of every kind which I got with her by marriage, or such part thereof as shall be in my possession at the time of my decease -

I also give and bequeath unto my said wife the sum of one hundred pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania to be paid unto her within six months after my decease - all which the foregoing is to be in full lieu of her thirds or dower out of my Estate -

Item - I give and bequeath unto my two sons Jacob and John each the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds like money as aforesaid in full for each his respective share out of my estate to be paid to them their heirs or legal representatives respectively -

Item - I give & bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth one hundred pounds like money as aforesaid to be paid unto her or her legal representatives which with eighty one pounds herebefore advanced to
