On this 15th June, A.D. eighteen hundred and seventy two, personally appeared before me, Reuben W. Spargus Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas a court of record in and for the county and State aforesaid Catharine Osburne aged 68 years, a resident of Highland County, State of Ohio, who being duly sworn according to law, declares that she is the widow of Enoch Osburne, who served the full period of sixty days in the Military Service of the United States in the war of 1812, and who was the identical Enoch Osburne who

was the identical Enoch Osburne who volunteered in Captain George W. Barrere's company, don't know the Regiment or division, at Newmarket, on the day of May 1812 and was honorably discharged at _____ on the day of _____ 1812; That he served as a private and was in General Hull's division and with Hull's army when he surrendered, That she was married under the name of Catharine Coontz to said Enoch Osburne on the 18th day of August 1824, by a Presbyterian Minister by the name of _____

Edgar at Maysville Kentucky there
being no legal barrier to such marriage,
That her said husband died at Liberty
Township Highland County, Ohio,
on the 12 day of June 1859, and that
she has not remarried since his
death; That at no time during the
late rebellion against the author-
ity of the United States did she or
her ^{ed} husband adhere to the cause
of the enemies of the Government,
giving them aid or comfort, or ex-
ercise the functions of any office
whenever under any authority, or pre-
tended authority, in hostility to the
United States; That she will
support the constitution of the
United States; That she is not

previous act; That she makes
this declaration for the purpose of be-
ing placed on the pension rolls of
the United States, under the provis-
ions of the act approved February 14th
1871 and the amendments thereto, and
she hereby constitutes and appoints,
with full power of substitution and
revocation Henry Rhoades, ^{4 of Hillsboro} her true
and lawful attorney, to prosecute

ance with her, that she is the identical

at no time during the late rebellion

the Government, or give them aid or
comfort; and that they have no

interest in the prosecution of this
claim.

knowledge of deponents.


